Some highlights of our successes include:

- Spearheading vaccination clinics for high-risk populations in the southeastern United States. Through partnerships with community organizations and local health departments, our agency hosted Georgia's first community mpox vaccination clinic.
- Combating the opioid crisis by creating additional recovery programs, because no matter where our patients are in their journey, PIHC offers a recovery pathway tailored to their needs.
- Continuing to listen, staying committed, and taking active steps to create a more equitable and inclusive future for our community in the face of systemic racism.

In 2022, PIHC grew our clinical caseload by more than 2,200 patients. We also introduced the use of injectable HIV treatment and prevention medication for eligible patients, and we continued our charge to serve as a teaching institution by training future leaders through our internship programs.

We are a nonprofit organization staffed and supported by strategic thinkers, problem solvers, and people who never tire in their desire to assist others. Thank you for helping us create lasting change.

RESPONSIVE + PREVENTIVE MPOX MEDICAL CARE

Sexual health and responsive care to public health outbreaks is at our core. In May 2022, mpox made headlines as it began to spread in the United States and globally. PIHC responded urgently and became one of the first organizations in Georgia to offer screenings, testing, vaccinations, and mpox treatment at our all our Centers.

In collaboration with local health departments, PIHC was able to test samples and host vaccination events to protect our community. While in medical care at PIHC, our patients testing positive for mpox accessed treatment to support healthy outcomes. In addition, PIHC hosted community engagement sessions via Zoom and developed strategies to support patients emotionally as the symptoms of mpox affected their daily lives.





PROGRAM HIGHLIGHTS

Patient Prescription Copay Assistance Program

We provide financial assistance to eligible patients to aid in medication affordability.

In 2022, this program covered the full cost or copays of 25,792 prescriptions to patients in need —30% of all prescriptions filled.

When you fill with us, you help make this happen since all funds generated by PIHC pharmacies go back to helping patients in need.





Compliance Packaging

We now offer BlistAssist®, a blister-card medication packaging system that allows patients to receive medications in a medication dose card, similar to birth control, assisting with drug identification and dosing times. This program provides additional care for our aging patient population living with HIV.



The Connect Program

The Connect program is a multi-session, prevention-based, one-on-one skill building program for youth and young adults. Individuals work with a trained youth counselor to explore personal goals and commit to a prevention action plan. The program is open to individuals 13 to 29 years of age of all gender expressions and sexualities. Patients and clients will explore many topics including HIV/STI prevention, HIV disclosure and stigma, sexuality or gender identity, communication, high STI reinfections, and self-confidence.

Expanded Hours

Every year, PIHC works to eliminate structural barriers to care for those living with HIV and for those needing HIV prevention PrEP. Engagement in care is crucial to improving clinical outcomes for patients and reducing HIV transmission. Flexible appointment scheduling is essential to building health equity in our communities.

PIHC expanded hours now include early mornings, evenings, and weekends.

Mental Health Interns

Positive Impact Health Centers has trained **more than 150 behavioral health professionals.** Every year, we partner with universities to serve as a practicum/internship site for graduate students pursuing Masters in Social Work, Professional Counseling and doctorates in Counselor Education and Clinical Psychology. We are a highly desirable site for students because of our well-known training and supervision program. Each student receives an orientation, direct observation of sessions by experienced clinical staff, and has their initial sessions conducted under live observation. They also receive weekly group and individual supervision. Our interns provide more than 300 direct service hours to clients each year. By having this program, PIHC extends it's ability to provide needed services and also increases the Atlanta community's future capacity to provide culturally competent care to the LGBTQ+ and HIV community.

Training tomorrow's leaders

PIHC Pharmacies participate as a pharmacy leadership rotation site for both Mercer and Philadelphia College of Osteopathic Medicine pharmacy students. Last year, we hosted pharmacy students on their Advanced Pharmacy Practice Experience (APPE) rotation with a focus in pharmacy leadership. Pharmacy students shadowed during a five-week period, working on inventory management, 340B compliance auditing, and implementation of new pharmacy services to patients.

Lead On-Demand: The Baltic Exchange

In 2022, we had the honor of hosting a group who participated in Combating HIV/AIDS in the Baltics an exchange part of the U.S. Department of State's Leaders Lead On-Demand Program. Individuals from Estonia, Latvia, and Lithuania came to our state-of-the art Duluth Center to tour the facility, meet department directors, and engage in a learning opportunity designed to help build the capacity of local non-governmental organizations (NGOs) interested in strategies for educating highrisk populations. In addition,

session attendees also explored how best to gain skills to advocate better for people living with HIV, learn harm reduction techniques, innovations in prevention and treatment, and improve adherence in their home countries.

This collective approach of sharing information, resources, and successes will not only end HIV in Atlanta, but globally.





Bridging the Gap

After three days of intense work, four strong strategic goals emerged, including bringing 15,000 out-of-care patients into care. The Board is continuing to work closely with department directors and managers to achieve this goal.

As the new strategic plan becomes more detailed, PIHC staff and Board members remain steadfast in offering services that help end the HIV epidemic in Georgia.

PARTNER HIGHLIGHTS

KAISER PERMANENTE.

Kaiser Permanente

is committed to helping shape the future of health care. The PIHC mission well complements that of Kaiser Permanente—to provide high-quality, affordable health care services and improve the health of the communities served. Kaiser patient care is focused on the total health of individuals, guided by personal Permanente Medical Group physicians, specialists, and teams of caregivers.

For several years, Kaiser has provided grants to support PIHC's insurance navigation and insurance premium support services, helping keep people living with HIV insured. Expert and caring medical teams at Kaiser are empowered and supported by industry-leading technology advances and tools for health promotion, disease prevention, state-of-the-art care delivery, and world-class chronic disease management. As Georgia's largest non-profit health plan, Kaiser Permanente has 317,000 members in 28 counties in metro Atlanta and four counties near Athens. We are grateful for their partnership to end the HIV epidemic in Georgia.

The Community Foundation for Greater Atlanta



has proudly supported Positive Impact Health Centers for decades and applauds its commitment to supporting those impacted by HIV. The Community Foundation was a pioneer of HIV/AIDS philanthropy, making its first grant in 1981, when the disease was still was known as GRID (Gay Related Immune Disease). The Atlanta AIDS Fund was created in 1991 to support metro Atlanta's HIV/AIDS advocacy, prevention education and service efforts, and to date, has issued more than \$11 million in funding. **Since inception of the fund, AID Gwinnett and Positive Impact have received a combined 64 grants totaling \$1,275,126, including 12 grants totaling \$487,931 after merging in 2015.** The Atlanta AIDS Fund is a partnership between the Community Foundation, United Way of Greater Atlanta, Jeffrey Fashion Cares and the Allen Thornell HIV Care and Service Fund.

Athens Pride + Queer Collective



(APQC) is dedicated to the advancement of equity, affirmation, diversity, and wellness of queer populations in the greater Athens, Georgia area by working with historically marginalized communities through outreach, social connection, education, and events. Positive Impact Health Centers was a proud sponsor of 2022 Athens PrideFest and the first Pride Parade in Athens with more than 3,000 people in attendance. APQC is grateful for the support, testing, prevention education, and referrals for treatment services provided by PIHC. The sponsorship funding provided by PIHC supported the establishment of the Trans Healthcare Surgery Scholarship Program and support groups for youth, parents of youth, and those experiencing religious trauma. The APQC Board of Directors also toured the PIHC Duluth Center to explore how to expand future partnership opportunities and learn more about services provided to the community.

Felix's Atlanta,

one of Midtown Atlanta's gay bars, has proudly supported PIHC for years. Last summer, Felix's hosted a Boys of Summer contest that ran for eight weeks, raising more than \$6,000 for services needed for individuals living with HIV. In addition, they hosted several other events benefiting PIHC in 2022, including the Felix's Navidad holiday party.



ADVOCACY

During the 2023 legislative session, Positive Impact Health Centers joined other advocacy organizations to fight legislation harming our patients and community and make progress on bills to improve the lives of individuals living with HIV.





Healthcare Medicaid Redetermination

From April 1 to May 31, 2023, Medicaid redeterminations must be completed in Georgia. Roughly 2.7 million people with Medicaid coverage will be reevaluated, and it is estimated 545,000 Georgians will lose coverage.

Georgia Pathways to Coverage Plan

Beginning July 1, 2023, Georgia will be the first in the country to require those on Medicaid to devote 80 hours per month working at a job, attending school or volunteering. This day honoring long-term survivors of HIV received a special 2022 proclamation issued by the Georgia House of Representatives.

Healthcare.gov

Georgia will be moving away from healthcare.gov to a state-based exchange program.

SB140

SB140 passed and was signed into law by Gov. Brian Kemp. This bill prohibits sex reassignment surgeries (never performed in Georgia) and hormone replacement therapies for minors. Amendments to this bill were made, resulting in revocation of medical licenses/permits and criminalizing medical providers and healthcare facilities from following the standard of care for the treatment of gender dysphoria.

HB140

HB140 passed the House and Senate, allowing qualified pharmacy technicians to administer vaccinations under pharmacist supervision.

SB46

SB46 passed, requiring physicians and healthcare providers to test all pregnant women for HIV and Syphilis at the first prenatal visits, at 28–32 weeks gestation, and at delivery. DONORS Q E E E E HANK YOU

Long Acting Injectable Therapy

Its been almost two decades since the first single tablet regimen became available to patients living with HIV. Taking a single pill for the treatment of HIV made a significant impact for many lives around the world. We are entering a new frontier for HIV treatment and prevention with long acting injectable therapies.

As always, PIHC led the way with long acting injectable therapies for both HIV treatment (Cabotegravir/ Rilpivirine) (Cabotegravir/ Apretude) and the prevention of HIV in 2022.
